Begin Sentences in Different Ways

When writing, it's important to **start sentences in different ways** instead of beginning the same way, such as always starting with "I" or "The." Here are some easy ways to vary your sentence beginnings:

1. **Use Interjections, Change the Subject, Use Questions,**
2. **Begin with a Phrase or Clause, Start with an Action Word**

The second entry sounds better because it uses a variety of sentence starters, such as "Today," "After," and "Do you know." This variety makes the writing flow more smoothly and avoids repetitive beginnings. The interjection "yum" in the second entry should be capitalized and punctuated as "Yum!"
