Write From Different Points of View

Point of view (POV) is the perspective from which a story is told, shaping how readers experience events and characters.

1. **First-Person:** The narrator is the speaker, using pronouns like "I" and "my."
2. **Second-Person:** The narrator addresses the reader directly, using "you."
3. **Third-Person:** The narrator is an outside observer, using "he," "she," "they," or names.

Write a sentence in first-person, second-person, and third-person perspectives based on the scenario.

Scenario: A child is eating lunch in the school cafeteria

1. **First-Person:** "I grabbed my tray and scanned the room, hoping to find a seat near my friends." (Hint: Write as if you are the child eating lunch.)

3. **Third-Person:** "The boy sat quietly, eating his sandwich while watching the lunchroom buzz with chatter." (Hint: Describe the scene from an outside observer's view.)
