Direct and Indirect Objects

A **direct object** receives the action of the verb directly and answers the question "what?" or "whom?"

An **indirect object** indicates to whom or for whom the action of the verb is performed and typically appears between the verb and direct object.

Example:

The professor offered the students (**indirect object**) valuable advice (**direct object**).
