# Adverbial Clauses

## Definition

An **adverbial clause** is a subordinate clause that functions as an adverb. It modifies verbs, adjectives, or adverbs by providing information about time, place, reason, condition, or contrast. These clauses begin with subordinating conjunctions like when, where, because, if, or although.

## Example

| Type      | Example                                               | Subordinating Conjunction |
|-----------|-------------------------------------------------------|---------------------------|
| Time      | "We left after the concert ended."                    | after                     |
| Place     | "The dog buried its bone where no one would find it." | where                     |
| Reason    | "She won because she worked hard."                    | because                   |
| Condition | "If it rains, we'll cancel the picnic."               | if                        |
| Contrast  | "Although he was tired, he finished."                 | although                  |

#### Possible answers:

1. (adverbial clause of time):

When surface water sources are depleted

As rainfall becomes scarce in the dry season

While the surface terrain remains parched and dry

2. (adverbial clause of reason):

because it lacks cloud cover and moisture to moderate temperatures

because the sandy soil quickly absorbs heat during the day and releases it at night

since there is little vegetation to provide shade or retain moisture

3. (adverbial clause of place):

where natural springs emerged from the Great Artesian Basin

where certain indicator plants grew in the landscape
