To achieve strong sentence fluency, your writing needs to have **a purposeful rhythm** created by varying sentence lengths. Smooth sentences flow naturally from word to word and phrase to phrase, making them clear and easy to read. Sometimes, you may need to expand or combine sentences to improve their flow.

By mixing short sentences with longer ones, you create writing that feels balanced and engaging. Long sentences allow for detailed descriptions or in-depth explanations, while short sentences add emphasis or quick clarity. Both are important for making your writing fluent and enjoyable to read.
