Write an Effective Conclusion

A strong conclusion does more than say “In conclusion” or “The end.” It sums up your writing, leaves a lasting impression, and provides closure for your readers. No matter the type of writing—whether it’s an essay, story, or article—a conclusion should tie together your ideas and give readers a sense of satisfaction.

Remember: Surprises in a conclusion can be powerful, but they must be purposeful. A good conclusion wraps up your topic and makes readers feel that your writing is complete and meaningful.

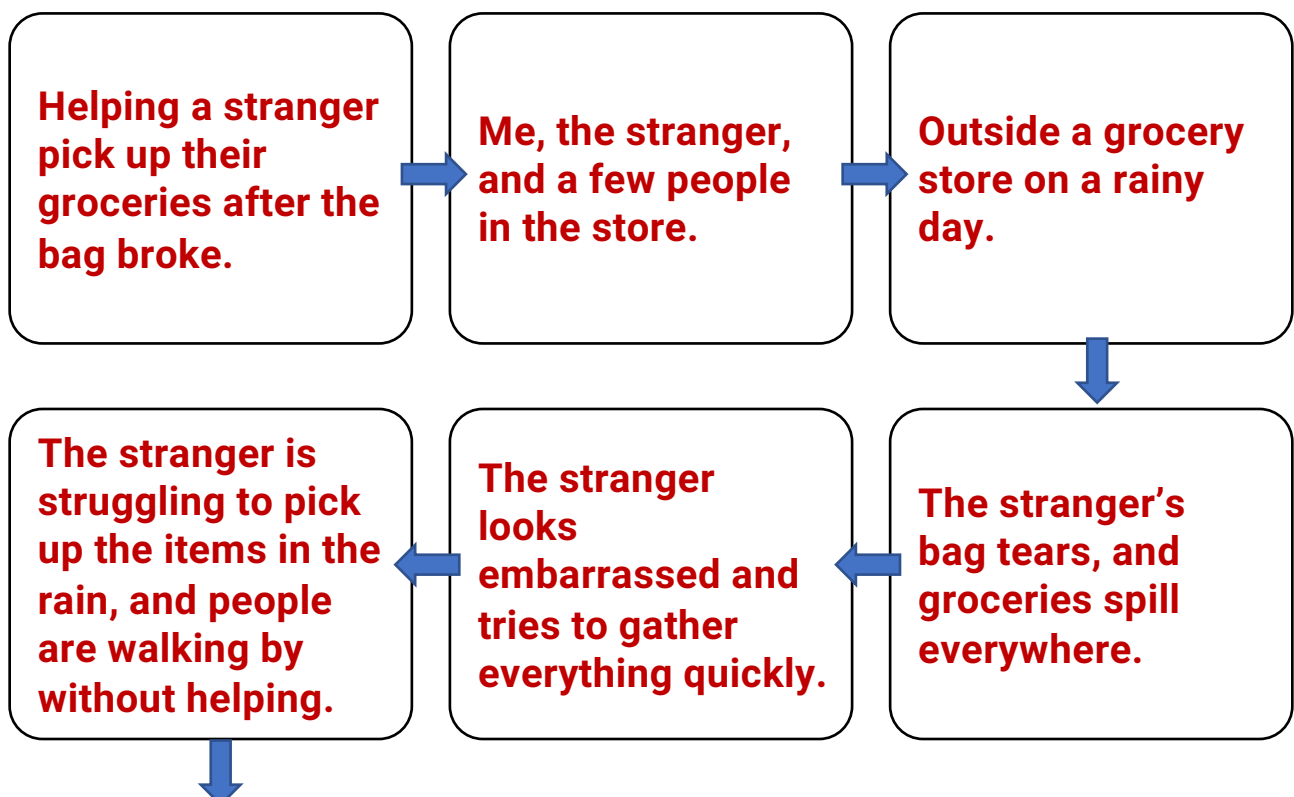

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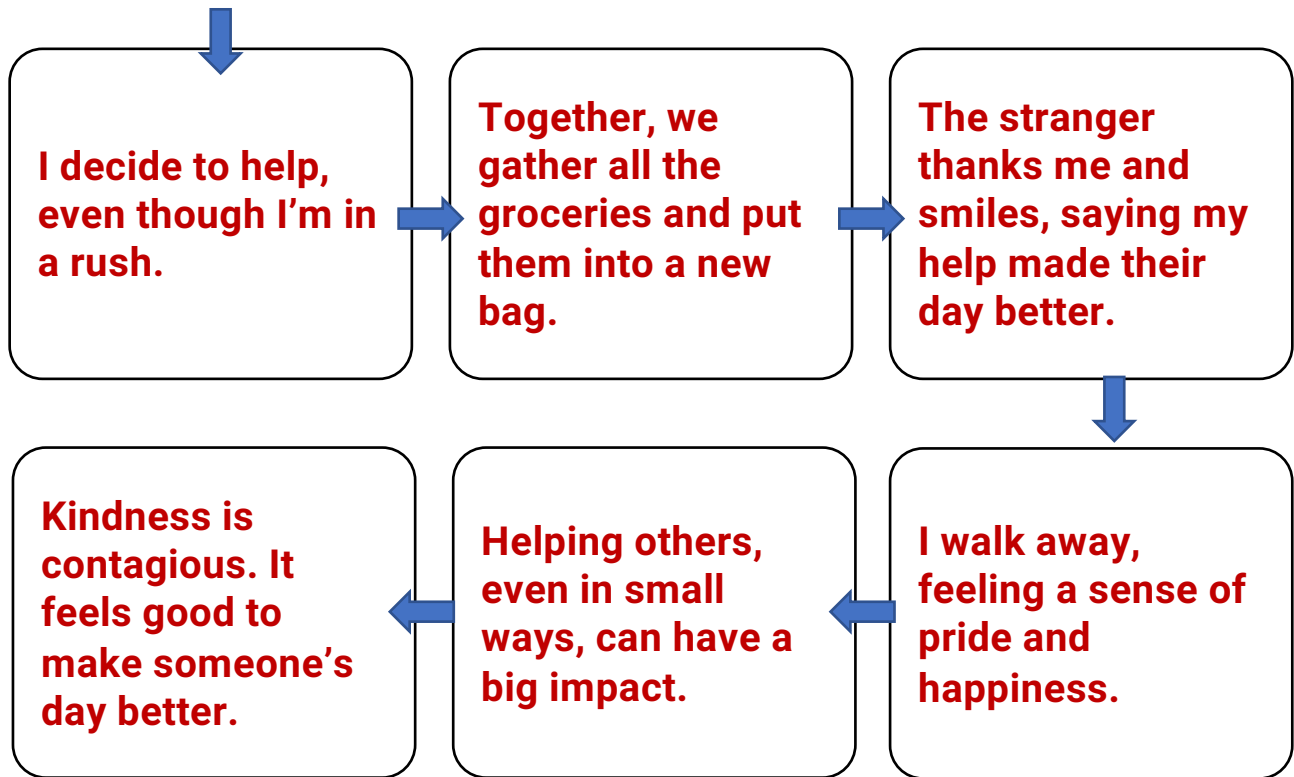
